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Attitudes to Migrant Workers: Results from the Northern Ireland Ominbus Survey

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Analytical Services Occasional Publication

Introduction

Since the accession of the A8 countries¹ to the EU in 2004 there has been a substantial increase in the level of migrant workers arriving in NI, although recent data from the Workers Registration Scheme indicated a decline in the number of migrant workers coming to Northern Ireland in the last couple of years. Whilst there is a general acceptance that migrant workers have made a positive contribution to the economy and society, there are indications that some public attitudes towards migrant workers were negative, for example as indicated by the incidence of racially-motivated attacks, some of which were directed at migrant workers.

In recognition of the significance of the problems faced by migrant workers and the implications of substantial numbers of migrant workers on society and on the provision of services, the NI Executive agreed that the Race Equality Forum was best placed to coordinate work on this issue. A thematic sub-group, chaired by the Department for Employment and Learning (DEL), was established in June 2006 and was tasked to produce a strategy and action plan. One of the recommendations in the Action Plan was that research should be undertaken into the public's perception to migrant workers in NI. As a result, DEL sponsored a series of questions in the January 2007 NI Omnibus Survey on attitudes to migrant workers. The same questions were asked again in the 2008, 2009 and 2010 NI Omnibus Surveys in order to get an indication of any changes in the attitudes of the general population to migrant workers.

The NI Omnibus Survey

The NI Omnibus Survey is a sample survey conducted several times a year by the Central Survey Unit of the Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency (NISRA) and is designed to provide a snapshot of the behaviour, lifestyle and views of a representative sample of people in NI. Fieldwork for this survey took place in May 2010.

¹ The A8 countries are Czech Republic, Estonia, Hungary, Latvia, Lithuania, Poland, Slovenia and Slovakia. Some restrictions were placed on the right to work in the UK by nationals of these countries following accession. Cyprus and Malta, which also acceded in May 2004, were not subject to similar restrictions.

The survey comprises two parts: core questions about the respondents and their individual circumstances, and a variety of mainly attitudinal questions commissioned by clients.

The sample to be surveyed is drawn from the Valuation and Lands Agency list, the most up-to-date listing of private households in NI. At each address one person aged 16 or over was selected to participate. 1,114 interviews were achieved from an eligible sample of 1,991 individuals, giving a response rate of 56%. The sample is designed to be representative of the NI adult population. Further information relating to the sample can be found in the Technical Notes section of this report.

Findings

Some of the key findings from the 2010 Omnibus Survey are outlined below.

- 52% of respondents feel that government should place more restrictions on migrant workers (Question 1).
- 53% of respondents come into contact with migrant workers either daily or once or twice a week (Question 2).
- 28% of respondents think that NI people were very prejudiced towards migrant workers (Question 3). However, only 4% of respondents consider themselves to be very prejudiced – although 29% describe themselves as “a little prejudiced” (Question 4).
- 47% of respondents agree or strongly agree that migrant workers are generally good for the local economy (Question 5).
- 48% of respondents feel that migrant workers take jobs away from people who were born in NI (Question 6).
- 30% of respondents agree or strongly agree that migrant workers come to NI just to get social security benefits (Question 7).
- 16% of respondents consider migrant workers were more law abiding than locals – although 38% took a contrary view (Question 8).

- 58% of respondents agree or strongly agree that migrant workers are more hard working than local workers (Question 9).
- 70% of respondents feel that the number of migrant workers coming to NI puts a strain on services (Question 10).
- 73% of respondents think that migrant workers mostly take up jobs local workers don't want (Question 11).
- 83% of respondents agree that migrant workers are prepared to work for lower wages than local workers (Question 12).

Responses to the questions from the 2010 survey are presented below, broken down by age group; gender; religion; socio-economic group; employment status; economic activity; highest educational qualification; urban/rural split; and by area (Belfast; East of NI; and West of NI). There are some differences in responses by different groups as exemplified by responses to Question 1 (government restrictions on migrant workers in the UK and NI):

- Respondents in the 25-44 age group are less likely to think that government should place more restrictions on migrant workers (45%) than older respondents (56% for those aged 45-64²; and 56% for those aged 65 and over)².
- Males (51%) are less likely than females (53%) to want more government restrictions on migrant workers³, whereas Catholics (41%) are less likely than Protestants (62%) to want greater restrictions².
- 41% of respondents from the managerial and technical social group favour greater restrictions compared with around 60% of 'skilled' respondents (skilled non-manual 59%, skilled manual 57%, part skilled 56%)².
- Almost half (48%) of those in paid employment and 56%³ of those not in paid employment want greater restrictions. The results were similar for economic activity (i.e. economically active respondents less likely to want more restrictions)

- Just over one third (36%) of those with a degree wanted greater restrictions compared to 57% of those without qualifications².
- There was no difference between respondents from urban and rural areas - 51% of respondents from urban areas wanted greater restrictions compared to 52% of those from rural areas³.
- There does appear to be a difference by geography – only 42% of those from Belfast wanted greater restrictions compared to 55%² of those from the East of NI and 51% of those from the West of NI⁴.

Northern Ireland Omnibus Survey: Technical Notes

1.1 The Sample

The sample for the May survey consisted of a systematic random sample of addresses selected from the Land and Property Services Agency list of private addresses. This is the most up-to-date listing of private households and is made available to the Northern Ireland Statistics and Research Agency for research purposes. People living in institutions (though not in private households in such institutions) are excluded. A total of 2,200 addresses were selected for interview.

The Land and Property Services Agency provides a good sampling frame of addresses, but contains no information about the number of people living at an address. Further selection stages were therefore required to convert the listing of addresses to a listing of individuals from which one person (the 'selected respondent') is chosen to complete the questionnaire.

Interviewers are instructed to call at each address issued in their assignments. At the first stage of the survey, they have to identify the number of households resident at the address and, where necessary, select one using a selection table (Table 1.1).

The interviewers then list all members of the household who are eligible for inclusion in the sample: that is, all persons currently aged 16 or over living at the address. From this listing of eligible adults, the interviewer's computer randomly selects one adult. This person, the selected respondent, is then asked to complete the interview.

1.2 The Fieldwork

Addresses were issued to a panel of 210 interviewers in the middle of April 2010. The fieldwork period was 1st May to the 29th May 2010.

1.3 Representativeness of the Sample

In any survey there is a possibility of non-response bias. Non-response bias arises if the characteristics of non-respondents differ from those of respondents in such a way that they are reflected in the responses given in the survey. Accurate estimates of non-response bias can be obtained by comparing characteristics of the achieved sample with the distribution of the same characteristics in the population at the time of sampling. Such comparisons are usually made to the current Census of Population data.

To assess how accurately the Omnibus Survey sample reflects the population of Northern Ireland the sample has been compared with characteristics of the Northern Ireland population from Mid Year Population Estimates (Table 1.3). The Omnibus Sample has also been compared to the achieved sample of the Continuous Household Survey (CHS).

1.4 Weighting

Selecting only one individual for interview at each sampled address means that the probability of selection for the survey is inversely related to the size of the household. In other words individuals living in large households have a lower chance of being included in the sample than individuals in small households.

Before analysis, all households which provided a selected respondent are examined and the data are weighted in relation to the number of eligible adults at the address derived from the details of household structure recorded by interviewers on the questionnaire. This weighting process adjusts the results to those that would have been achieved if the sample had been drawn as a random sample of adults rather than of addresses. In this sample 35% of households consisted of one adult, while 48% of households consisted of two adults. 11% of households contained three adults, while 6% of households consisted of four or more adults.

Note: on occasions, in tables showing weighted data, the sum of column totals does not equal the grand total. This is due to the rounding process associated with weighting. The percentages in the tables are based on weighted data but the totals are unweighted.

1.5 Sampling Error

No sample is likely to reflect precisely the characteristics of the population it is drawn from because of both sampling and non-sampling errors. An estimate of the amount of error due to the sampling process can be calculated. For a simple random sample design, in which every member of the sampled population has an equal and independent chance of inclusion in the sample, the sampling error of any percentage, p , can be calculated by the formula:

$$\text{s.e. } (p) = \sqrt{p*(100 - p)/n}$$

where n is the number of respondents on which the percentage is based. The sample for the NI Omnibus Survey is drawn as a random sample, and thus this formula can be used to calculate the sampling error of any percentage estimate from the survey.

A confidence interval for the population percentage can be calculated by the formula

$$95 \text{ per cent confidence interval} = p \pm 1.96 * \text{s.e. } (p)$$

If 100 similar, independent samples were chosen from the same population, 95 of them would be expected to yield an estimate for the percentage, p , within this confidence interval.

The absence of design effects in the survey, and therefore of the need to calculate complex standard errors, means that standard statistical tests of significance (which assume random sampling) can be applied directly to the data.

1.6 Notation

The percentages quoted in tables have been rounded to the nearest number. Where the base was less than 100, the actual number is given rather than the percentages denoted by the column label.
