Destinations of Leavers from UK Higher Education Institutions: Northern Ireland analysis 2010/11

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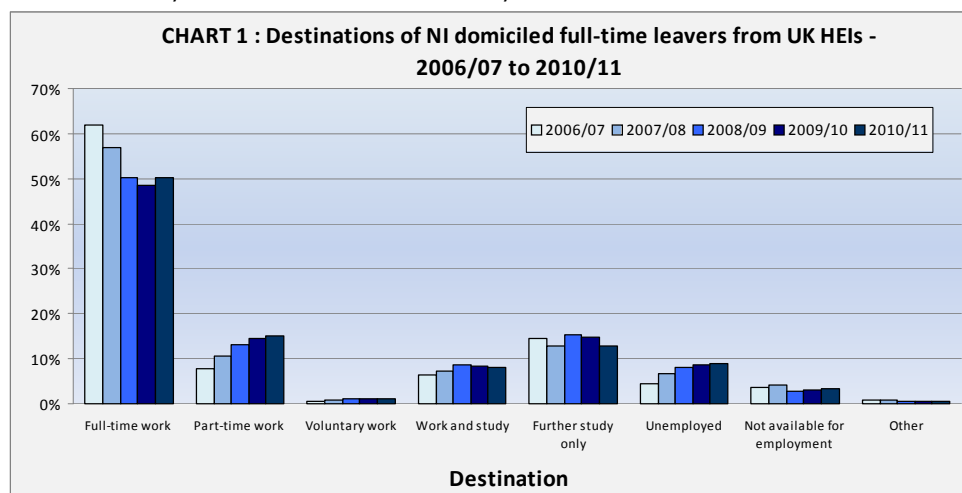
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This statistical bulletin has been produced by the Department for Employment and Learning, Northern Ireland (NI) and presents findings from 2010/11 Destinations of Leavers from Higher Education survey. Findings include:

- Over the last five years the unemployment rate of NI domiciled full-time leavers has increased from 4% to 9% (Chart 1).
- Over the same period the proportion of NI domiciled leavers in full-time work decreased whereas the proportion in part-time work increased (Chart 1).
- The average salary of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment has increased by 9% from £18,685 in 2009/10 to £20,445 in 2010/11.



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Coverage

This statistical bulletin has been produced by the Department for Employment and Learning, Northern Ireland (NI) and presents findings from 2010/11 Destinations of Leavers from Higher Education (DLHE) survey. The DLHE survey is carried out six months after a student leaves Higher Education (HE). For more information on the DLHE survey see the [notes and definitions](#) section below. The statistics presented in this bulletin cover a range of topics including, the proportion of students who go into work or unemployment, the proportion of students who leave NI for employment, the average salary level of graduates, the destinations of students from different subject areas and institutions. Summaries are also provided for the last 5 academic years.

Policy and Operational Context

The Minister for DEL has responsibility within the NI Executive and to the NI Assembly for the NI Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) and their students; and for student support for NI-domiciled students in NI and the rest of the UK. The Assembly's DEL Committee has a scrutiny role in regard to these issues.

The current landscape in HE continues to show strong demand, while changes in fee regimes throughout the UK and the effects of the economic recession continue to cause headlines for the HE Sector.

It is within this context that DEL has developed a Higher Education Strategy for Northern Ireland, which aims to promote and sustain the development of an internationally competitive sector, accessible to all who are able to benefit, given the funding available, and meeting the needs of the Northern Ireland economy and wider society. This bulletin forms part of the evidence base informing the implementation of the HE Strategy, and will help shape the Department's future policies.

Who will be interested?

The information presented in this statistical bulletin will be of interest to a wide variety of people. For example the statistics within and those derived from this bulletin are currently used by DEL policy officials in their role of assisting and advising the Minister for DEL to discharge his duties; by the NI Assembly and DEL committee to scrutinise the HE sector; by other government departments such as the Department of Education to monitor the destination of teaching graduates; by prospective students to inform their choices around higher education; by local businesses to quantify the supply of graduates in their business area and by researchers and academics to try and understand the underlying trends in HE. Further details about the uses made of HE statistics can be found in the [notes and definitions](#) section below.

Structure

The bulletin is divided into two sections. Section 1 focuses on the destinations of NI domiciled students who gained a qualification at a HEI in NI, England, Scotland or Wales. Section 2 concentrates on the destinations of all NI, GB and other EU students who gained a qualification at a NI HEI. This division into two sections reflects the two distinct policy and operational responsibilities of the Minister and the Department. Furthermore, it is clear from customer feedback, the nature of questions on HE asked in the Northern Ireland Assembly, and coverage of HE issues in the local media, for example, that these two aspects are of interest to readers. Therefore it has been decided to present breakdowns of information on HE along these two dimensions in this bulletin.

Section 1 – Destinations of Northern Ireland domiciled leavers from UK Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in 2010/11

- In 2006/07, 77% of NI domiciled full-time leavers were in employment after six months. This figure fell to 75% in 2007/08 and then declined again to 73% in 2008/09 and 2009/10 before increasing to 75% in 2010/11.
- Over the same period, the proportion of NI domiciled full-time leavers who were unemployed increased each year from 4% in 2006/07 to 9% in 2010/11. However, these leavers still experience consistently lower rates of unemployment than the total 18 to 24 year old NI population.
- Most NI domiciled leavers in employment who studied in Great Britain (GB) did not return to NI to work. Only 38% of NI domiciled full-time leavers from GB HEIs in employment were employed in NI. The comparable figure for NI domiciled leavers from NI HEIs is 84%, (90% in 2009/10).
- The employment rate of NI domiciled full-time leavers varied depending on subject area studied. The rate was highest for those who studied Medicine & dentistry (97%) and lowest for those who studied Languages (58%). However, it is worth noting that 27% of leavers from Language courses were engaged in further study only.
- The average salary of NI domiciled full-time first degree leavers in full-time employment was £20,205, a 6% increase from the 2009/10 figure of £19,065. Over the same period the Government's measure for inflation (CPI) rose by 3.5%.

Section 2 – Destinations of leavers from Northern Ireland Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in 2010/11.

- In 2006/07, 77% of full-time leavers from NI HEIs were in employment after six months. This figure declined year on year to 72% in 2009/10 before rising to 75% in 2010/11.
- The proportion of full-time leavers from NI HEIs who were unemployed increased each year from 4% in 2006/07 to 10% in 2009/10 but fell to 9% in 2010/11.
- 84% of NI domiciled full-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in NI (90% in 2009/10), whereas non NI domiciled leavers from NI HEIs are more likely to leave NI to work with only 30% employed in NI.
- The unemployment rate of full-time leavers from NI HEIs varied depending on subject area. The rate was highest for those who studied Creative Arts and Design (20%) and lowest for Medicine & dentistry leavers (1%).
- The average salary of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment has increased by 9% from £18,685 in 2009/10 to £20,445 in 2010/11.

SECTION 1: Destinations of Northern Ireland domiciled leavers from UK Higher Education Institutions in 2010/11 (Tables 1 to 11)

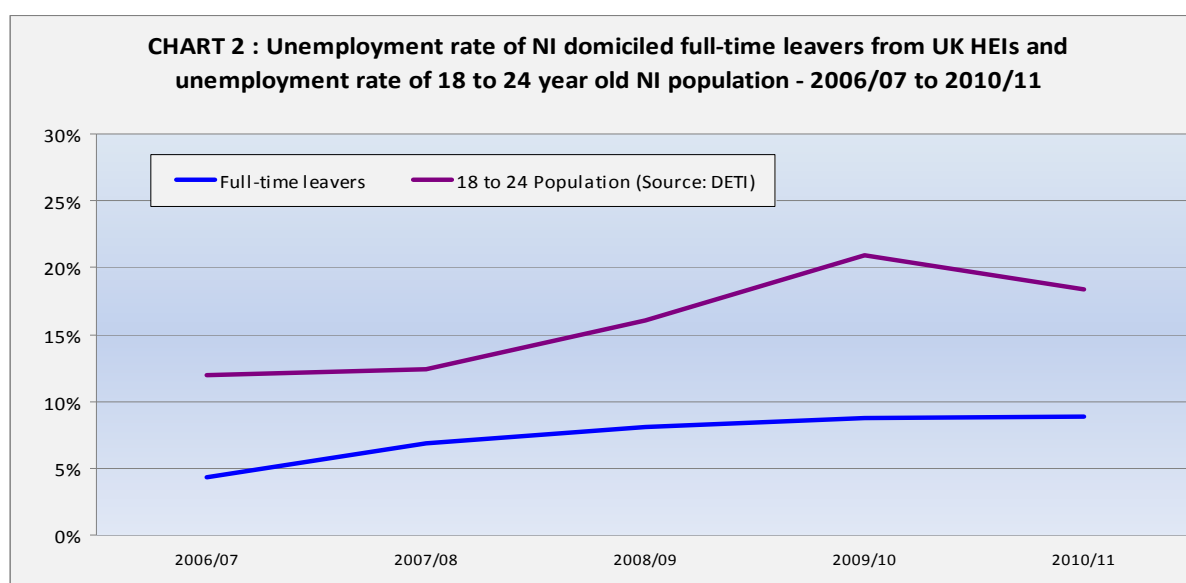
Unless otherwise stated, leavers in employment include those in full-time work, part-time work, voluntary work and those combining work and study.

1.1 Destinations six months after leaving

1.1.1 Destinations time series 2006/07 to 2010/11 (Table 1, Charts 1&2)

Full-time leavers

- In 2006/07, 77% of NI domiciled full-time leavers were in employment after six months. This figure fell to 75% in 2007/08 and then declined again to 73% in 2008/09 and 2009/10 before increasing to 75% in 2010/11.
- In terms of mode of work, the proportion of leavers in full-time work only, has fallen from a high of 62% in 2006/07 to a low of 49% in 2009/10, with a slight increase to 50% in 2010/11. In contrast, the proportion in part-time work only, has increased from 8% in 2006/07 to 15% in 2010/11.
- Full-time students moving into further study only accounted for 13% of NI domiciled leavers in 2010/11, the same proportion as in 2007/08. This 13% was a five year low in comparison to 14% in 2006/07 and 15% in both 2008/09 and 2009/10.
- The proportion of NI domiciled full-time leavers recorded as being unemployed has increased each year from 4% in 2006/07 to 9% in 2010/11. However, chart 2 below highlights that NI domiciled full-time leavers experience consistently lower rates of unemployment than the total 18 to 24 year old NI population.



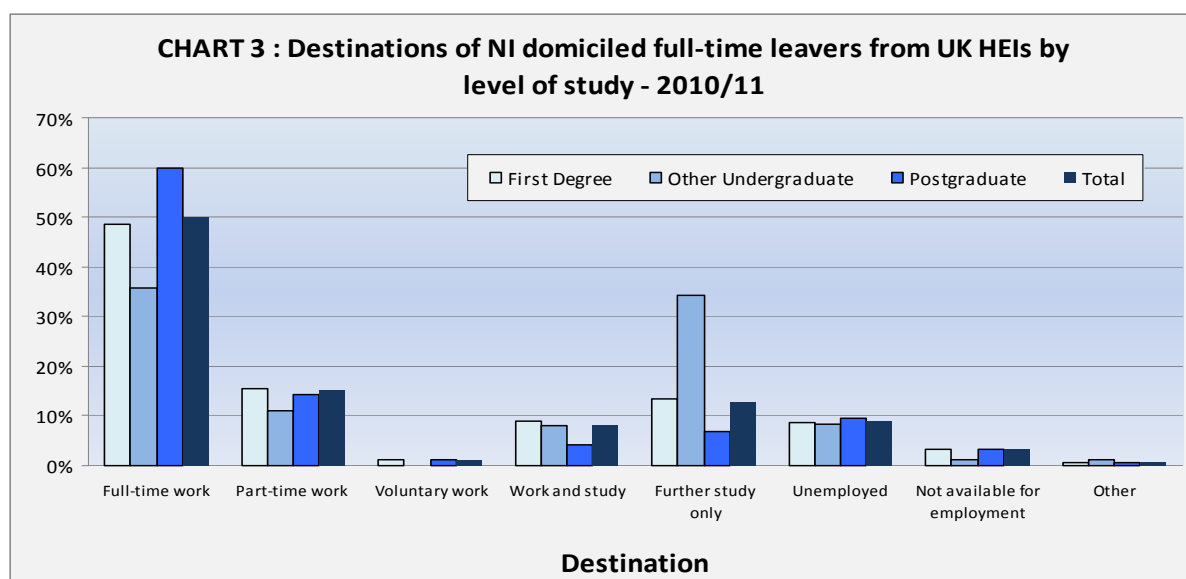
Part-time leavers

- In 2006/07, 91% of NI domiciled part-time leavers were in employment. This proportion has decreased each year to 87% in 2010/11.
- The unemployment rate of NI domiciled part-time leavers has risen year on year from 2% in 2006/07 to 5% in 2010/11.

1.1.2 Destinations by mode, level, gender & location of institution – 2010/11 (Tables 2&3, Chart 3)

Full-time leavers

- Six months after leaving, 50% of NI domiciled full-time leavers were in full-time work, 15% in part-time work, 1% in voluntary work and 8% combining work and further study – a total of 75% in employment.
- A further 13% of leavers were in further study only, 9% were unemployed, 3% were not available for employment and 1% of leavers were engaged in other activities.
- Gender – NI domiciled full-time male leavers (70%) were less likely to be in employment than their female counterparts (78%). Males (11%) were more likely to be unemployed than females (7%).
- Level of study – Chart 3 below displays the variation in outcomes between different levels of study. 74% of NI domiciled full-time first degree leavers were in employment compared to 55% of other undergraduate and 80% of postgraduate leavers. First degree (13%) and other undergraduate (34%) leavers were more likely to be in further study only than postgraduate (7%) leavers.



- **Location of Institution** – The employment rate of NI domiciled full-time leavers differed depending on the location of their institution. 75% of those from NI HEIs were in employment, 73% from Scotland and England HEIs and 72% from Wales HEIs. Unemployment rates were higher for NI domiciled full-time leavers from Wales HEIs (16%) compared to those from NI (9%), England (9%) and Scotland (8%) HEIs.

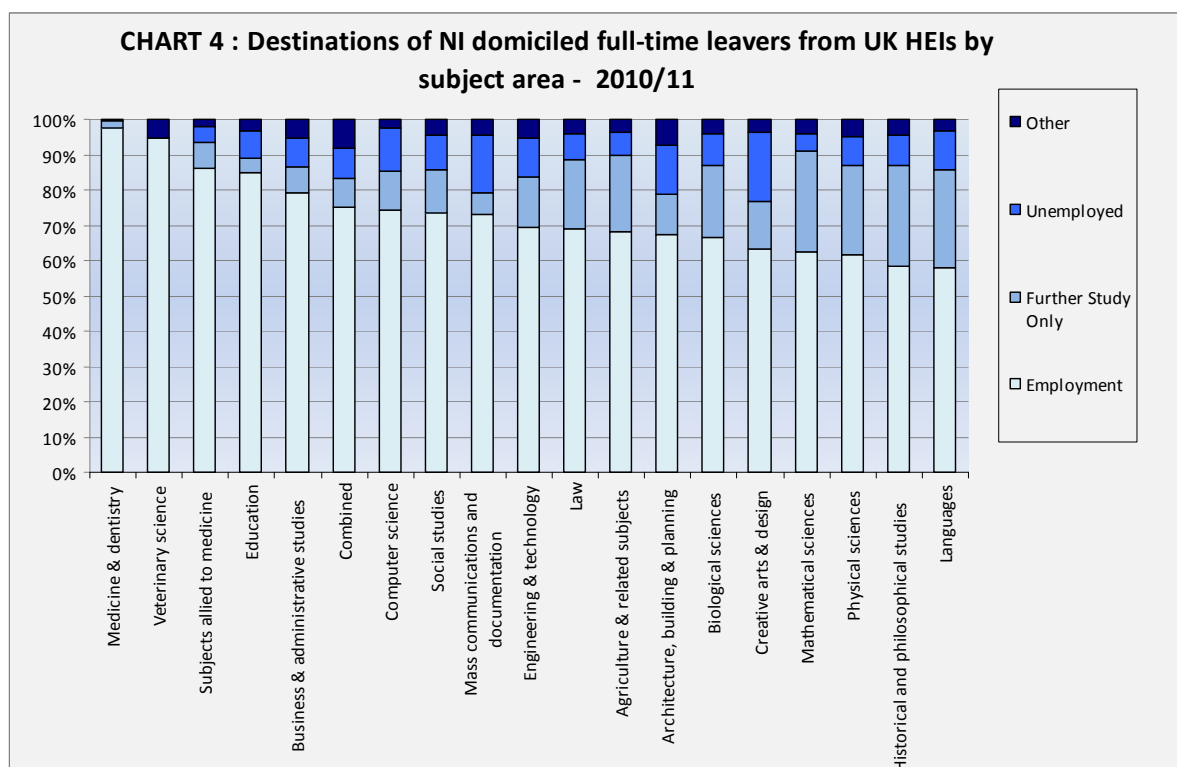
Part-time leavers

- Of those NI domiciled leavers who studied part-time, 63% were in full-time work, 10% in part-time work, 1% in voluntary work and 13% were combining work and study – a total of 87% in employment. The remainder were in further study only (5%), unemployed (5%) or not available for employment (3%).
- **Gender** – NI domiciled female part-time leavers (88%) were more likely to be in employment than males (85%). However, males (65%) were more likely to be in full-time work only than females (61%), with females more likely to be in part-time work only (13%) than males (4%).

1.1.3 Destinations by subject area studied (Table 4, Chart 4)

Full-time leavers

- Chart 4 below displays how the destinations of NI domiciled full-time leavers vary depending on the subject area studied. The proportion in employment was highest for those who studied Medicine & dentistry (97%), Veterinary science (95%), Subjects allied to medicine (86%) and Education (85%).



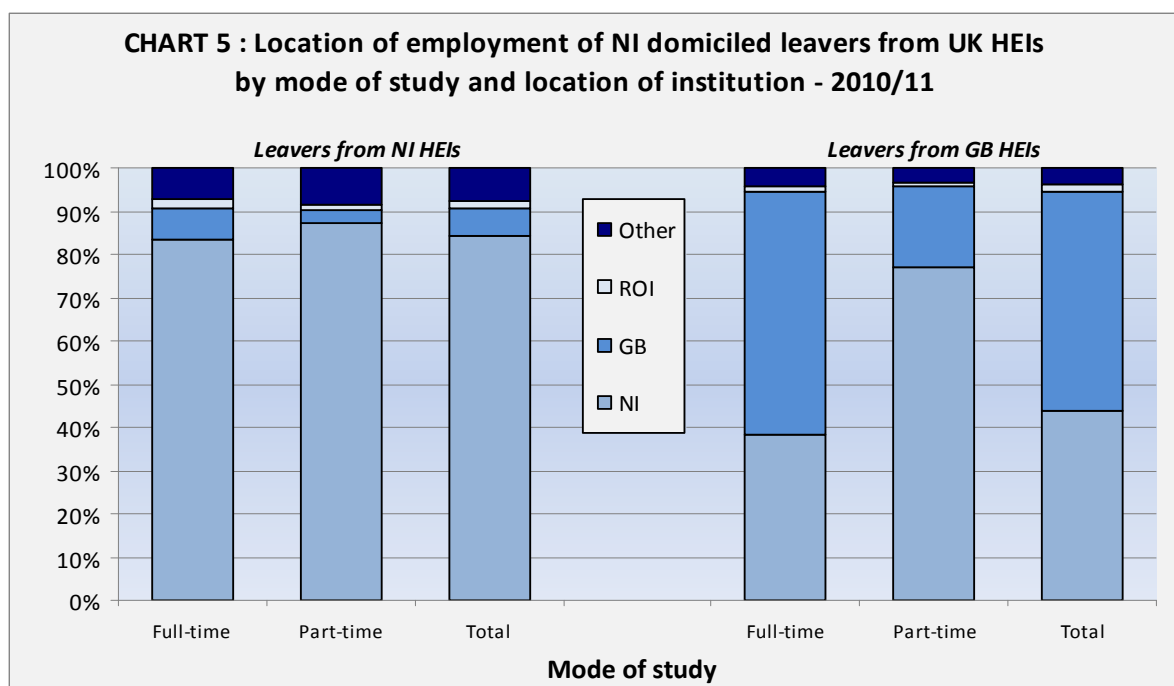
- The subject areas with the lowest proportion of NI domiciled full-time leavers in employment include Creative arts & design (63%), Mathematical sciences (62%), Physical sciences (61%), Historical and philosophical studies (58%) and Languages (58%). However, it is worth noting that these subjects had some of the highest proportion of students going into further study only. For example, 29% of Mathematical science leavers were in this category.
- The unemployment rate was highest for NI domiciled full-time leavers who studied Creative arts & design (20%), Mass Communications and Documentation (17%) and Architecture, building and planning (17%). An unemployment rate of less than 1% was recorded for Medicine & dentistry and Veterinary Science leavers.

1.2 Employment

1.2.1 Location of Employment (Tables 5a, b & c, Chart 5)

Full-time leavers

- Of those NI domiciled full-time leavers from UK HEIs in employment six months after leaving, 69% were employed in NI, 23% in GB, 2% in ROI and 6% elsewhere. However, large differences were observed between those who studied in NI and those who studied in GB.
- Location of institution – Most NI domiciled leavers in employment who studied in Great Britain (GB) did not return to NI to work. Only 38% of NI domiciled full-time leavers from GB HEIs in employment were employed in NI, 56% in GB, 1% in ROI and 4% elsewhere. The comparable figures for NI domiciled full-time leavers from NI HEIs are 84% employed in NI, 7% in GB, 2% in ROI and 7% elsewhere.



- Gender – 71% of NI domiciled full-time female leavers in employment were employed in NI compared to 67% of males.
- Level of study - 72% of NI domiciled full-time first degree leavers in employment were employed in NI compared to 58% of other undergraduates and 57% of postgraduates.

Part-time leavers

- 85% of NI domiciled part-time leavers in employment after six months were employed in NI, 7% in GB, 1% in ROI and 7% elsewhere.
- Location of institution – 87% of NI domiciled part-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in NI, compared to 77% of NI domiciled part-time leavers from GB HEIs (including OU).

1.2.2 Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) (Table 6)

Full-time leavers

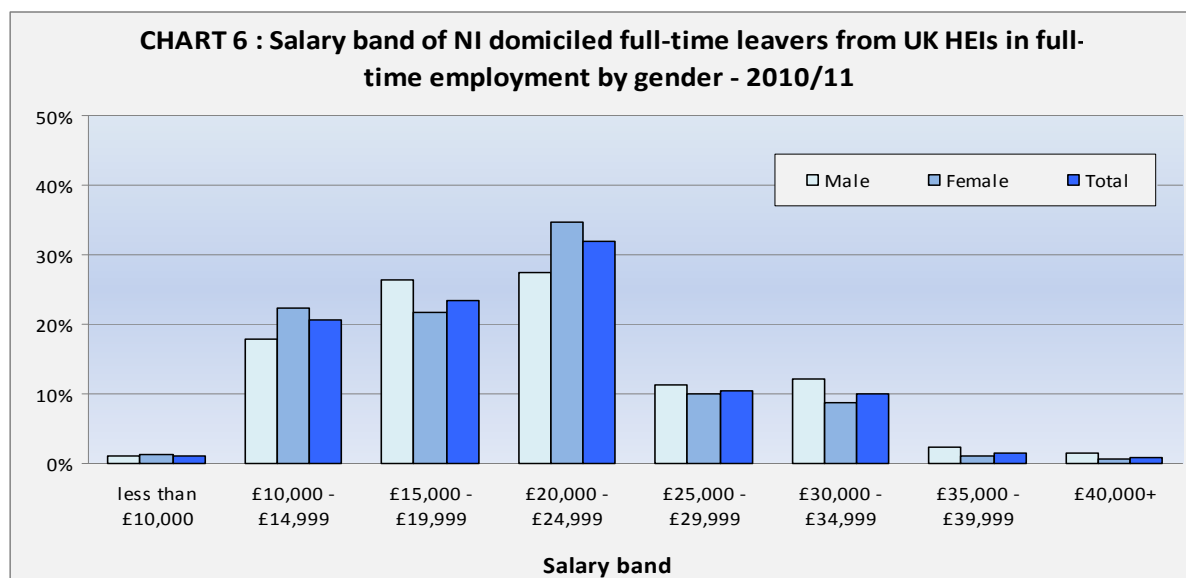
- Of those entering employment, 66% of NI domiciled full-time leavers took up positions in the top three SOC groups (Managers & Senior Officials, Professional Occupations or in Associate Professional & Technical Occupations).
- Gender – NI domiciled full-time males (68%) in employment were slightly more likely to be employed in the top three SOC groups than their female (64%) counterparts.
- Level of study - 63% of NI domiciled full-time first degree leavers in employment were employed in the top three SOC groups, compared to 62% of other undergraduates and 80% of postgraduates.

1.2.3 Salary of those in Full-time employment (Tables 7 - 10, Chart 6)

Salary is not a mandatory question in the DLHE survey resulting in a high non-response rate. Leavers in full-time employment whose salary was unknown have been excluded from the analysis; this represents 39% of those respondents in full-time employment. For 2010/11 the option “I do not wish to give that information” was removed from the telephone script when asking about leaver’s salary. The resultant effect of this change was an overall increase in the percentage disclosing salary information. HESA therefore advises caution in analysis by salary.

Full-time leavers

- The average salary of NI domiciled full-time leavers in full-time employment was £20,470 (median £20,000) a 4% increase from the 2009/10 figure of £19,700 (median 20,000). Over the same period the Government's measure for inflation (CPI) rose by 3.5%.
- Gender – NI domiciled full-time male leavers in full-time employment had an average salary of £21,105 (median £20,000). The equivalent figure for females was £20,055 (median £21,000).



- Level of study – The average salary of NI domiciled full-time first degree leavers in full-time employment was £20,205 (median £20,000), compared to other undergraduates - £21,450 (median £22,000) and postgraduates - £21,375 (median £21,000).
- Location of employment – The average salary of NI domiciled full-time leavers in full-time employment in NI was £19,115 (median £18,000). NI domiciled full-time leavers in full-time employment in GB had an average salary of £22,515 (median £22,000). This difference is consistent with findings from DETI's NI annual survey of hours and earnings. This survey reports that in April 2011 full-time employees in NI had the lowest median gross weekly earnings across the UK regions at approximately 90% of the UK figure.
- Location of institution - NI domiciled full-time leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment had an average salary of £20,310 (median £20,000). The equivalent figure for NI domiciled full-time leavers from GB HEIs was £20,740 (median £21,000).
- Standard Occupational Classification – The average salary of NI domiciled full-time first degree leavers in full-time employment was lowest for those in Personal Services Occupations - £12,775 (median £13,000) and highest for those in Professional Occupations - £23,900 (median £22,000).

Part-time leavers

- The average salary of NI domiciled part-time leavers in full-time employment was £30,415 (median £28,000).
- Gender – NI domiciled part-time male leavers in full-time employment had an average salary of £34,280 (median £32,000). The equivalent figure for females was £27,785 (median £26,000).

1.3 Further Study (Tables 1, 2 & 11)

Leavers in further study include those in further study only and those combining work and further study.

Full-time leavers

- 21% of NI domiciled full-time leavers were in further study six months after leaving. Of those, 68% were studying for a postgraduate qualification, 7% for a first degree, 4% for other diplomas or certificates, 14% for a professional qualification, 4% for other qualifications and 2% were not aiming for a qualification.
- Level of study – 22% of NI domiciled full-time first-degree leavers were in further study compared to 42% of other undergraduates and 11% of postgraduates. Of those in further study, first degree leavers were most likely to be studying for a postgraduate qualification (70%); other undergraduates were most likely to be studying for a first degree (56%) and postgraduates were most likely to be studying for another postgraduate qualification (68%).

SECTION 2: Destinations of leavers from Northern Ireland Higher Education Institutions in 2010/11 (Tables 12 to 24)

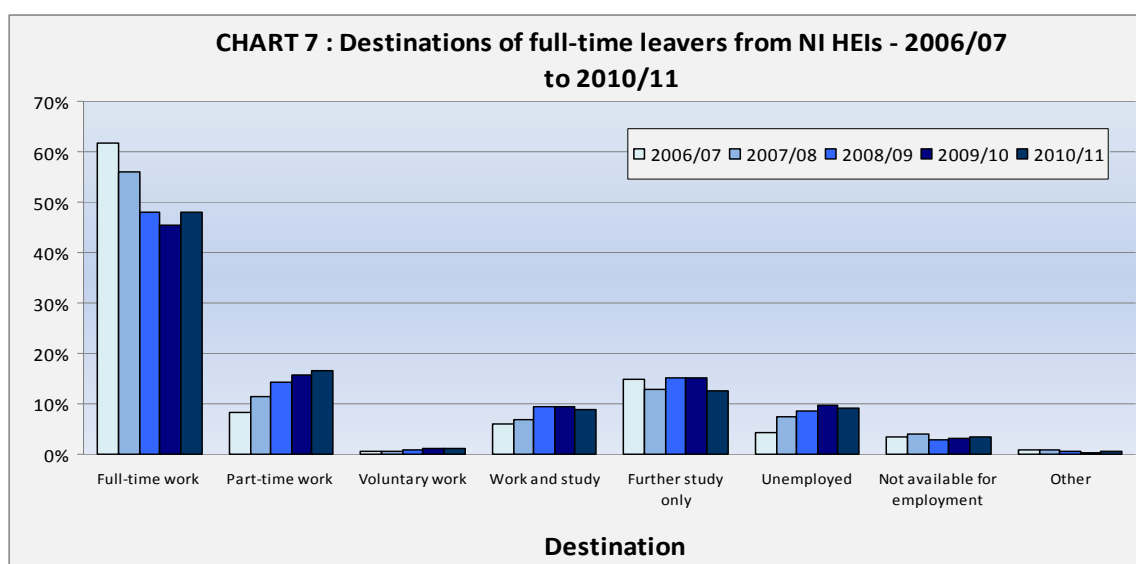
Unless otherwise stated, leavers in employment include those in full-time work, part-time work, voluntary work and those combining work and study.

2.1 Destinations six months after leaving

2.1.1 Destinations time series 2006/07 to 2010/11 (Table 12, Chart 7)

Full-time leavers

- In 2006/07, 77% of leavers from NI HEIs were in employment six months after leaving. This figure then experienced a year on year decline to 72% in 2009/10 before rising to 75% in 2010/11.



- In terms of mode of work, the proportion of leavers in full-time work only, fell from a high of 62% in 2006/07 to a low of 46% in 2009/10 before an increase to 48% in 2010/11. In contrast, the proportion of leavers in part-time work only, increased from 8% in 2006/07 to 17% in 2010/11.
- Full-time students moving into further study only has accounted for 15% of leavers in 2006/07, 2008/09 and 2009/10 with a dip to 13% in 2007/08 and 2010/11.
- The proportion of leavers from NI HEIs recorded as unemployed increased each year from 4% in 2006/07 to 10% in 2009/10 before dropping back to 9% in 2010/11. Over the same period the unemployment rate of the total 18 to 24 year old NI population rose from 12% to 18% (source DETI).

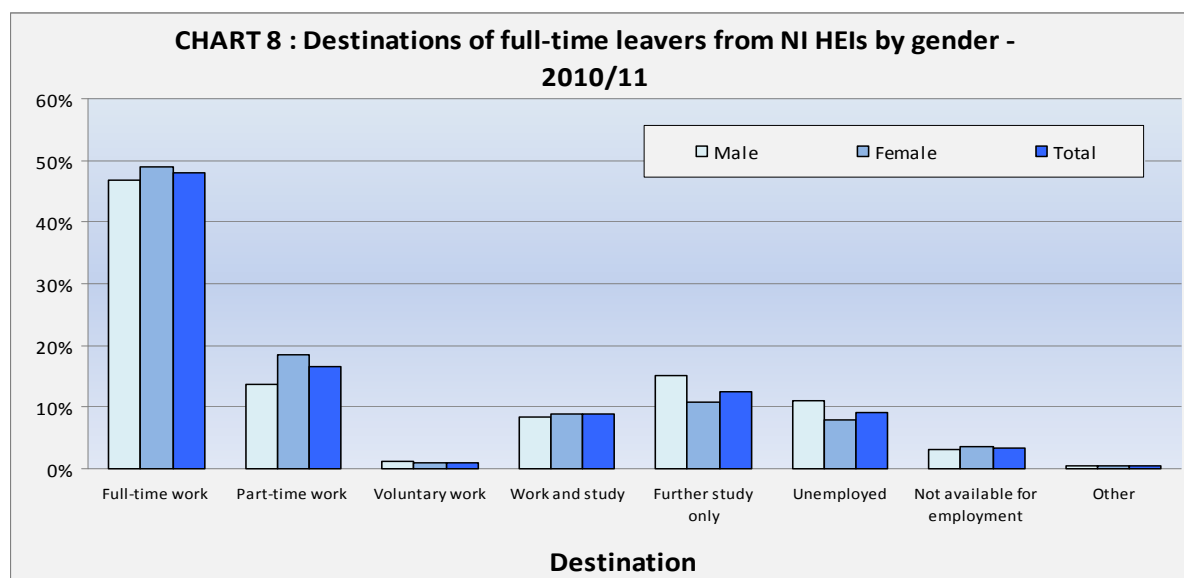
Part-time leavers

- In 2006/07, 92% of part-time leavers from NI HEIs were in employment. This portion decreased to 88% in 2010/11.
- The unemployment rate of part-time leavers from NI HEIs increased from 1% in 2006/07 to 5% in 2010/11.

2.1.2 Destinations by mode, level, gender, domicile and institution (Tables 13-15, Chart 8)

Full-time leavers

- Six months after leaving, 48% of full-time leavers from NI HEIs were in full-time work, 17% were in part-time work, 1% in voluntary work and 9% combining work and further study – a total of 75% in employment. An additional 13% were in further study only, 9% were unemployed and 3% were not available for employment.
- Gender – six months after leaving, 70% of full-time male leavers from NI HEIs were in employment compared to 77% of females. Males (11%) were more likely to be unemployed than females (8%).
- Level of study – six months after leaving, 74% of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs were in employment compared to 59% of other undergraduates and 77% of postgraduates. First degree leavers (14%) and other undergraduates (32%) were more likely to be in further study only than postgraduates (7%).



- Country of domicile - NI domiciled (75%) full-time leavers from NI HEIs were more likely to be in employment six months after leaving than GB domiciled (65%), Other EU domiciled (65%) and ROI domiciled (66%) full-time leavers from NI HEIs.

- Institution – Full-time leavers from Stranmillis (86%) were more likely to be in employment six months after leaving than those from University of Ulster (UU) (76%), St Mary's (75%) and Queen's University, Belfast (QUB) (69%).

However, QUB full-time leavers (16%) were more likely to undertake further study only than those from St Mary's (13%), Stranmillis (10%) and UU (8%).

The unemployment rate of full-time leavers was highest at UU (11%), while QUB (8%) and St Mary's (8%) experienced similar rates. Stranmillis had a low rate at 2%.

Part-time leavers

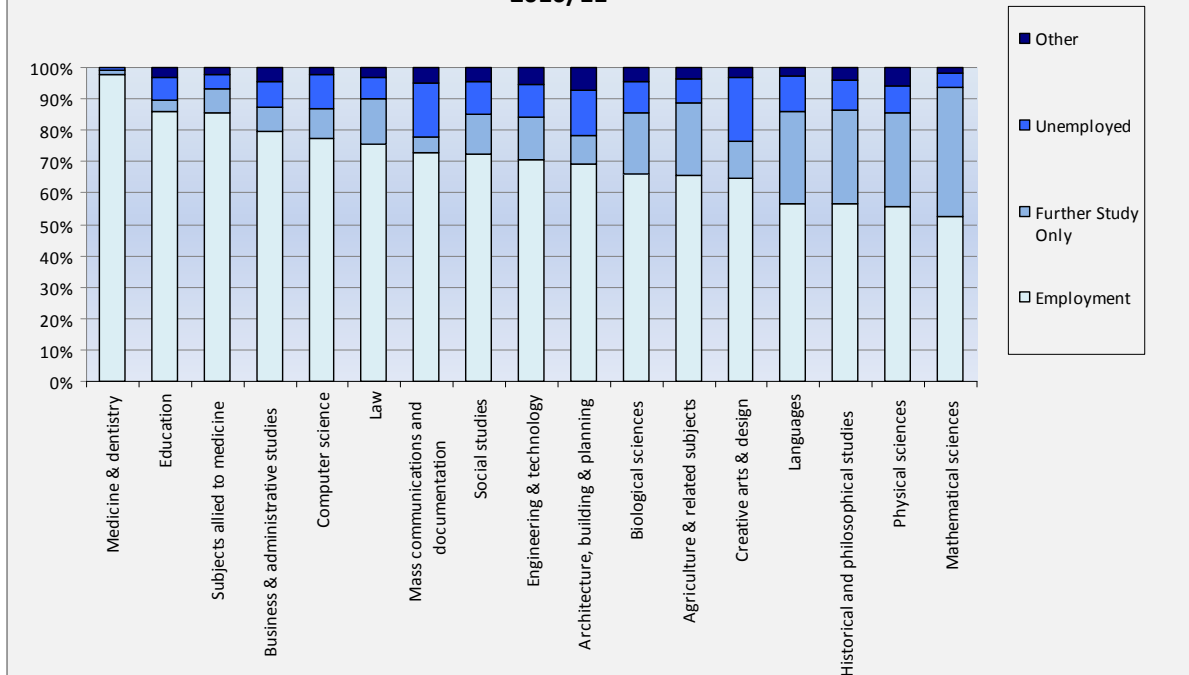
- Of those leavers from NI HEIs who were studying part-time, 69% were in full-time work, 9% in part-time work, and 10% were combining work and study – a total of 88% in employment. The remainder of leavers were either in further study only (4%), unemployed (5%) or not available for employment (3%).
- Gender – Male (88%) part-time leavers from NI HEIs were equally slightly more likely to be in employment than females (87%). Males (73%) were more likely to be in full-time work only than females (66%), with females more likely to be in part-time work only (11%) than males (4%).

2.1.3 Destinations by subject area studied (Table 16, Chart 9)

Full-time leavers

- The subject areas with the highest proportion of full-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment were Medicine & dentistry (98%), Education (86%), and Subjects allied to medicine (85%).
- The subject areas with the lowest proportion of full-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment were Languages (57%), Historical and philosophical studies (57%), Physical sciences (56%) and Mathematical sciences (52%). However, these subjects had some of the highest proportion of leavers going into further study only. For example 41% of Mathematical Sciences students were recorded in this category.
- The unemployment rate was highest for full-time leavers from NI HEIs who studied Creative arts and design (20%), Mass Communication and documentation (17%) and Architecture, building and planning (15%). An unemployment rate of 1% was recorded for Medicine & dentistry leavers.

2.1.4 Destinations - UK comparison (Table 17)

Full-time leavers

- Full-time leavers from NI HEIs were more likely to be in employment (75%) than leavers from England (72%), Scotland (72%) and Wales (71%) HEIs, however along with England (9%) they were also more likely to be unemployed than their counterparts from Wales (8%) and Scotland (7%) HEIs.
- 18% of full-time leavers from Scotland HEIs were in further study only, compared to 13% from NI HEIs, 16% from England HEIs and 16% from Wales HEIs.

Part-time leavers

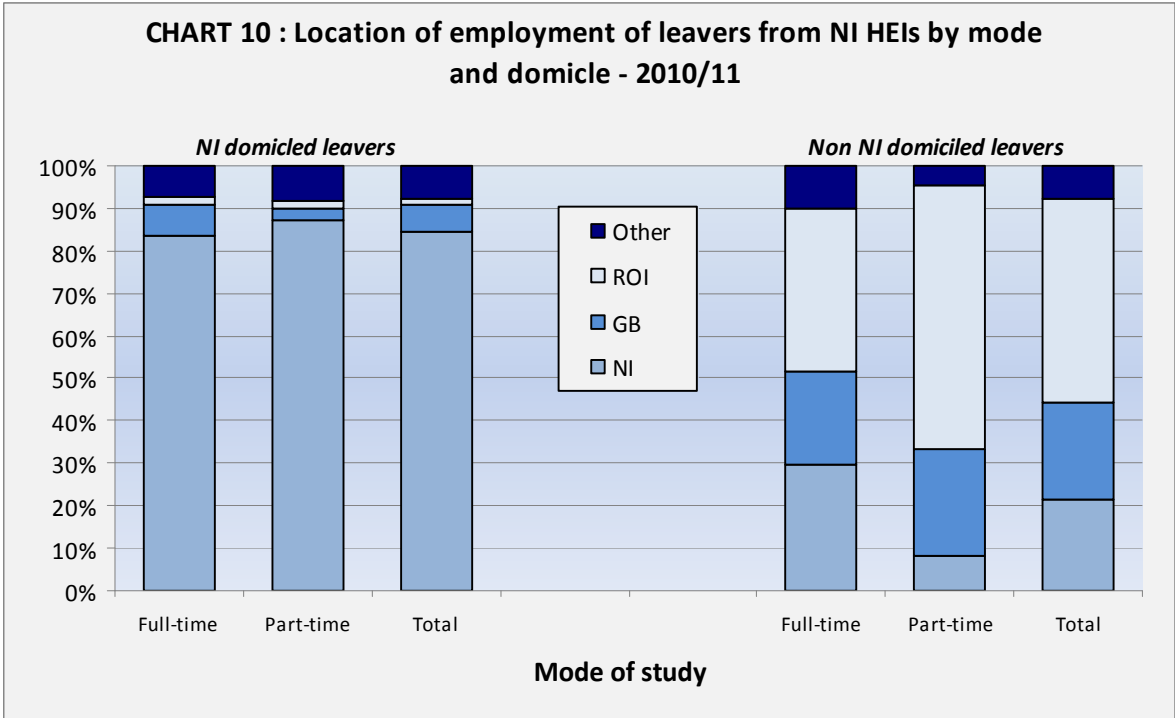
- 88% of part-time leavers from NI HEIs were in employment, compared to 86% from England HEIs, 90% from Scotland HEIs and 90% from Wales HEIs.
- However, part-time leavers from NI HEIs were more likely to be unemployed (5%), than those from England (4%), Scotland (2%) and Wales (2%) HEIs.

2.2 Employment

2.2.1 Employment - Location of Employment (Tables 18a, b & c, Chart 10)

Full-time leavers

- Of those full-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment six months after leaving, 79% were employed in NI, 8% in GB, 5% in ROI and 8% elsewhere.
- Country of domicile – Approximately 84% of NI domiciled full-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in NI, 7% in GB, 2% in ROI and 8% elsewhere. The comparable figures for non NI domiciled leavers from NI HEIs are 30% employed in NI, 22% in GB, 38% in ROI and 10% elsewhere.
- Gender – 80% of full-time female leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in NI compared to 79% of males.
- Level of study - 83% of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in NI compared to 95% of other undergraduates and 64% of postgraduates.



Part-time leavers

- 72% of part-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment after six months were employed in NI, 7% were employed in GB, 14% in ROI and 8% elsewhere.
- Country of domicile – 87% of NI domiciled part-time leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in NI, compared to 8% of non NI domiciled part-time leavers from NI HEIs.

2.2.2 Employment – Standard Occupational Classification (SOC) (Table 19)

Full-time leavers

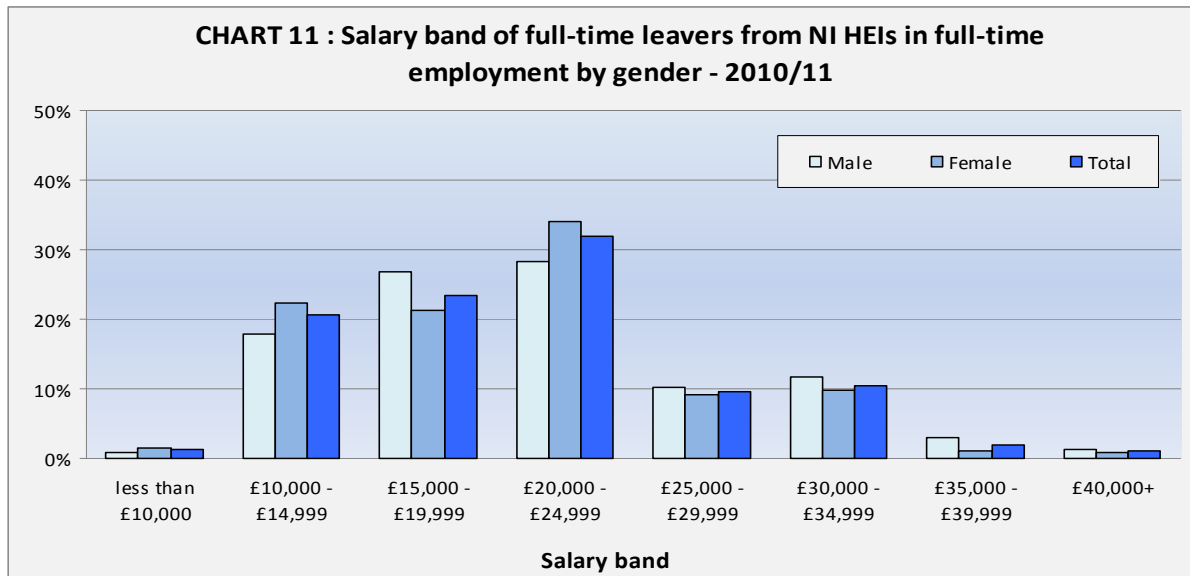
- Of those entering employment, 64% of full-time leavers from NI HEIs took up positions in the top three SOC groups (Managers & Senior Officials, Professional Occupations or in Associate Professional & Technical Occupations).
- Gender – 67% of full-time male and 62% of full-time female leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in the top three SOC groups.
- Level of study - 61% of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs in employment were employed in the top three SOC groups, compared to 46% of other undergraduates and 74% of postgraduates.

2.2.3 Employment – Salary of those in Full-time employment (Tables 20-23, Chart 11)

Salary is not a mandatory question in the DLHE survey resulting in a high non-response rate. Information on salary should therefore be interpreted with caution. Leavers in full-time employment whose salary was unknown have been excluded from the analysis; this represents 42% of those respondents in full-time employment. For 2010/11 the option “I do not wish to give that information” was removed from the telephone script when asking about leaver’s salary. The resultant effect of this change was an overall increase in the percentage disclosing salary information. HESA therefore advises caution in analysis by salary.

Full-time leavers

- The average salary of full-time leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment was £20,510 (median £20,000), a 2% increase from the 2009/10 figure of £19,185 (median £19,000). Over the same period the Government’s measure for inflation (CPI) rose by 3.5%.
- Gender – Full-time male leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment had an average salary of £21,140 (median £20,000). The equivalent figure for females was £20,115 (median £21,000).



- Level of study** – The average salary of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment was £20,445 (median £20,000), compared to other undergraduates - £17,750 (median £15,500) and postgraduates - £20,780 (median £20,000).
- Location of employment** – The average salary of full-time leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment in NI was £19,615 (median £19,000). Full-time leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment in GB had an average salary of £23,585 (median £23,000). This difference is consistent with findings from DETI’s NI annual survey of hours and earnings. This survey reports that in April 2011 full-time employees in NI had the lowest median gross weekly earnings across the UK regions at approximately 90% of the UK figure.
- Country of domicile** - NI domiciled full-time leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment had an average salary of £20,310 (median £20,000). The equivalent figure for GB domiciled full-time leavers from NI HEIs was £19,610 (median £19,000).
- Standard Occupational Classification** – The average salary of full-time first degree leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment was lowest for those in Elementary occupations - £12,705 (median £12,000) and highest for those in Professional Occupations - £23,930 (median - £22,000).

Part-time leavers

- The average salary of part-time leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment was £32,150 (median £30,000).
- Gender – Part-time male leavers from NI HEIs in full-time employment had an average salary of £36,245 (median £32,000). The equivalent figure for females was £29,500 (median £29,000).

2.3 Further Study (Tables 12 & 24)

Leavers in further study include those in further study only and those combining work and further study.

Full-time leavers

- 21% of full-time leavers from NI HEIs were in further study six months after leaving. Of those, 73% were studying for a postgraduate qualification, 5% for a first degree, 4% for other diplomas or certificates, 12% for a professional qualification, 5% for other qualifications and 1% were not aiming for a qualification.
- Level of study – 23% of full-time first-degree leavers from NI HEIs were in further study compared to 49% of other undergraduates and 11% of postgraduates. Of those in further study, first degree leavers were most likely to be studying for a postgraduate qualification (72%), while 65% of other undergraduates were most likely to be studying for a postgraduate qualification and postgraduates were most likely to be studying for another postgraduate qualification (79%).

General

This statistical bulletin has been produced by the Department for Employment and Learning, Northern Ireland (NI), using data collected by the Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) through the annual Destination of Leavers from Higher Education (DLHE) survey. The DLHE survey is carried out six months after students leave HE.
2. The bulletin is divided into two sections. Section 1 focuses on destinations of NI domiciled students who gained qualifications at Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) in NI, England, Scotland and Wales (UK) and Section 2 concentrates on destinations of all students who gained qualifications at NI HEIs. NI domiciled students at NI HEIs are included in both sections, accounting for 67% of Section 1 and 88% of Section 2.
3. **HESA** - The Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) is the official agency for the collection of information on publicly funded Higher Education institutions (HEIs) in the UK. It was set up in 1993 following the white paper "Higher Education: a new framework", which called for more coherence in Higher Education statistics. HEIs include all publicly funded universities. HESA data do not include enrolments at Further Education colleges in Northern Ireland or Great Britain, or enrolments at institutions in the Republic of Ireland.
4. **DLHE survey** – This Statistical Bulletin is based on data returned to HESA in respect of the 'Destinations of Leavers from Higher Education (DLHE) survey 2010/11'. The DLHE survey is carried out annually and provides information on the activities of students approximately six months after leaving. HESA released a publication on the 2010/11 DLHE on 26th July 2012, providing a high level UK analysis. The HESA report can be downloaded from the HESA website at http://www.hesa.ac.uk/index.php?option=com_content&task=view&id=2541&Itemid=161
5. **Target population** – The HESA DLHE target population includes all UK and EU domiciled leavers whose study was full-time or part-time at a UK HEI and who obtained relevant qualifications (see note 10) reported to HESA for the reporting period 1st August 2010 to 31st July 2011.
6. **Exclusions** - The population for the DLHE return does not represent the full cohort of leavers during the reporting period; examples of those excluded from the target population are listed below:
 - Leavers qualifying with professional qualifications (e.g. associate membership or membership of a body such as the Institute of Bankers) or undergraduate diplomas and certificates (other than foundation degrees, HND, DipHE, HNC and CertHE).
 - Non EU domiciled leavers.
 - Leavers whose mode of study was recorded as dormant during the reporting period. (This will include for example students submitting a thesis and students retaking exams during the reporting period).

7. **Response rate** - Of all NI domiciled leavers for whom DLHE information was expected, 83% responded (85% of full-time and 73% of part-time leavers). Of all leavers from NI HEIs for whom DLHE information was expected, 83% responded (86% of full-time and 71% of part-time leavers).
8. **Not Known** – Responses of not known have been included in the tables, but have been excluded for calculating percentages in the analysis.
9. **The survey dates** for the 2010/11 DLHE return were 18 April 2011 (if the leaver obtained the qualification between 1 August 2010 and 31 December 2010) and 9 January 2012 (if the leaver obtained the qualification between 1 January 2011 and 31 July 2011).
10. **Relevant qualifications** for inclusion in the 2010/11 DLHE return are listed below:

Postgraduate

Doctorate degrees, Postgraduate Certificates in Education, Other Postgraduate qualifications include masters degrees; other postgraduate qualifications obtained primarily through advanced supervised research; Masters of Business Administration (MBA); pre-registration masters degrees and other taught qualifications at level M leading towards obtaining eligibility to register to practice with a health or social care or veterinary statutory regulatory body; postgraduate bachelors degrees at level M; other taught qualifications at level M including those leading towards registration with the Architects Registration Board (Part 2 qualification).

First degree

Integrated undergraduate/postgraduate taught masters degrees on the enhanced/extended pattern, and first degrees with honours on the enhanced/extended pattern at level H; first degrees with honours/ordinary first degrees (including those leading to qualified teacher status (QTS)/registration with a General Teaching Council (GTC), but excluding those from the intercalated pattern); first degrees with honours leading towards registration with the Architects Registration Board (Part 1 qualification); pre-registration first degrees with honours/ordinary first degrees leading towards obtaining eligibility to register to practice with a health or social care or veterinary statutory regulatory body; first degrees with honours and diploma; postgraduate bachelors degrees at level H.

Other undergraduate

Foundation degrees, graduate diplomas/certificates at level H; other qualifications at level H including those leading towards registration with the Architects Registration Board (Part 2 qualification); graduate diplomas/certificates at level I; Diplomas of Higher Education (DipHE) (including those leading towards obtaining eligibility to register to practice with a health or social care or veterinary statutory regulatory body); Higher National Diplomas (HND); Certificates of Higher Education (CertHE); Higher National Certificates (HNC).

14. **Uses made of HE statistics**

This bulletin is disseminated directly to approximately 100 users. In addition, it is also published on the Department's website and the UK National Statistics publication hub (www.statistics.gov.uk/hub/index.html). Users include policy colleagues in DEL, academics, researchers, members of the public, the NI Assembly, other government departments and other interested parties and individuals.

The bulletin and further analysis of the data provide an evidence base that is used in a number of DEL policies, strategies and reviews. Some recent examples are: -

In addition, HE data are used within other NI departments and their agencies. Some of the most recent examples are: -

- DFP - as a key indicator in the Education Domain of the Northern Ireland Multiple Deprivation Measure.
- DE – teacher demand model
- Invest NI – to quantify the supply of graduates for potential inward investment to NI

Almost 300 HE statistical enquiries per year are received by the Department from various sources. These include requests for further breakdowns of enrolments, qualifications and destinations data.

In addition, approximately 25 assembly questions (either written or oral), relating to HE data, are received by the Department each year.

15. **Rounding Strategy** - To prevent the identification of individuals, figures in the attached tables are rounded to the nearest 5, with 0, 1, 2 rounded to 0. Due to rounding the sum of numbers in each row or column may not match the total shown. Percentages and averages are based on unrounded figures. Averages based on populations of 7 or fewer have been suppressed. Percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number; therefore the sum of percentages may not match totals.
16. **Consumer Prices Index (CPI)** measures changes in the price level of consumer goods and services purchased by households. It is the measure adopted by the UK Government for its inflation target. The CPI rose by 3.5% between January 2011 and January 2012 (<http://www.ons.gov.uk/ons/rel/cpi/consumer-price-indices/june-2012/index.html>). This figure is used in the bulletin to place the annual change in salaries in context. January was chosen because the survey date for the majority of 2010/11 DLHE surveys was 9 January 2012.

Definitions

17. **Higher education** students for the purpose of HESA's data collection are those students on courses for which the level of instruction is above that of level 3 of the Qualifications and Curriculum Authority (QCA) National Qualifications Framework (NQF) (e.g. courses at the level of Certificate of HE and above).
18. **Domicile** refers to a student's permanent place of residence prior to enrolment on an HE course.
19. **Other UK** includes Scotland, Wales, Guernsey, Jersey and the Isle of Man.
20. **GB** includes England, Scotland, Wales, Guernsey, Jersey and the Isle of Man.
21. The **Open University** is counted as a wholly English institution. The administrative centre is located in England, although The Open University teaches throughout the UK.
22. **Mode of study** distinguishes students studying full-time or part-time:
 - I. *Full-time* includes full-time and sandwich modes plus those writing-up where the mode of study was previously full-time and students changing to dormant status previously full-time.
 - II. *Part-time* includes those studying part-time, full-time for less than 24 weeks in the academic year, block release or studying during the evenings, plus those writing-up theses and previously part-time.
