



Statistical Bulletin: Essential Skills Enrolments and Outcomes - December 2010.

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The Department for Employment and Learning Northern Ireland (DELNI) launched the Essential Skills for Living Strategy and action plan in April 2002. The Essential Skills for Living Strategy aims to improve adult literacy and numeracy (& now Information & Communication Technology (ICT)) in Northern Ireland. Essential Skills courses are free to participants, which is funded by DEL and delivered by accredited tutors working in Further Education (FE) Colleges, private training providers and community organisations.

This statistical bulletin has been produced by the Department for Employment and Learning in Northern Ireland (NI). The bulletin focuses on students enrolled in Essential Skills courses across Northern Ireland since the start of the strategy in 2002. It details the number of enrolments, their characteristics and numbers qualifying in Essential Skills courses.

Key Points

- Since the start of the strategy in 2002 there have been nearly 177,000 enrolments (nearly 84,000 individuals) in Essential Skills courses.
- During the academic year 2009/10 there were nearly 50,000 enrolments, the highest for any academic year to date.
- The majority of enrolments are within Literacy (49%), with Numeracy accounting for 42% and ICT for 9%.
- The majority (71%) of enrolments are within the age band 16-25.
- Those part-time employed or unemployed accounted for nearly three quarters of enrolments (71%).
- There is a majority for Males, in terms of enrolments, with 53%.
- 31% of all enrolments came from the most deprived quintile of Northern Ireland super output areas.
- There have been nearly 87,000 qualifications issued by awarding bodies since the strategy began.
- Literacy qualifications accounts for just over half (51%) of all qualifications issued by awarding bodies. Numeracy accounts for 45% while ICT is 5%.
- Overall the Essential Skills programme has a retention rate of 85%, and achievement rate of 58% and a success rate of 49%.

How many are participating?

There have been nearly 177,000 enrolment records (nearly 84,000 individuals) in Essential Skills courses since the Strategy began in 2002. As set out in Table 1 and Figure 1, the numbers have increased progressively within each academic year as the Strategy has been rolled out.

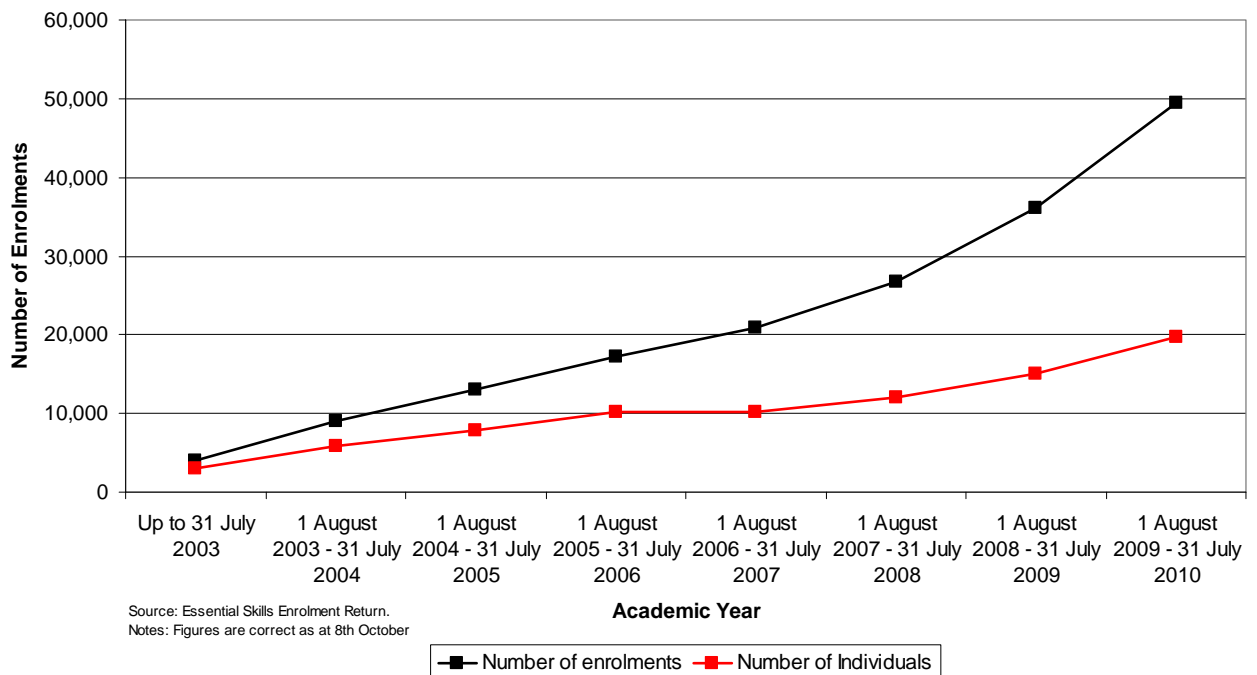

What are the characteristics of those participating?

Age

Table 2 and Figure 2 show the breakdown of the participants' age at the start of the course since the start of the Strategy. Nearly three quarters (71%) of the participants in Essential Skills courses are aged between 16 – 25 years.

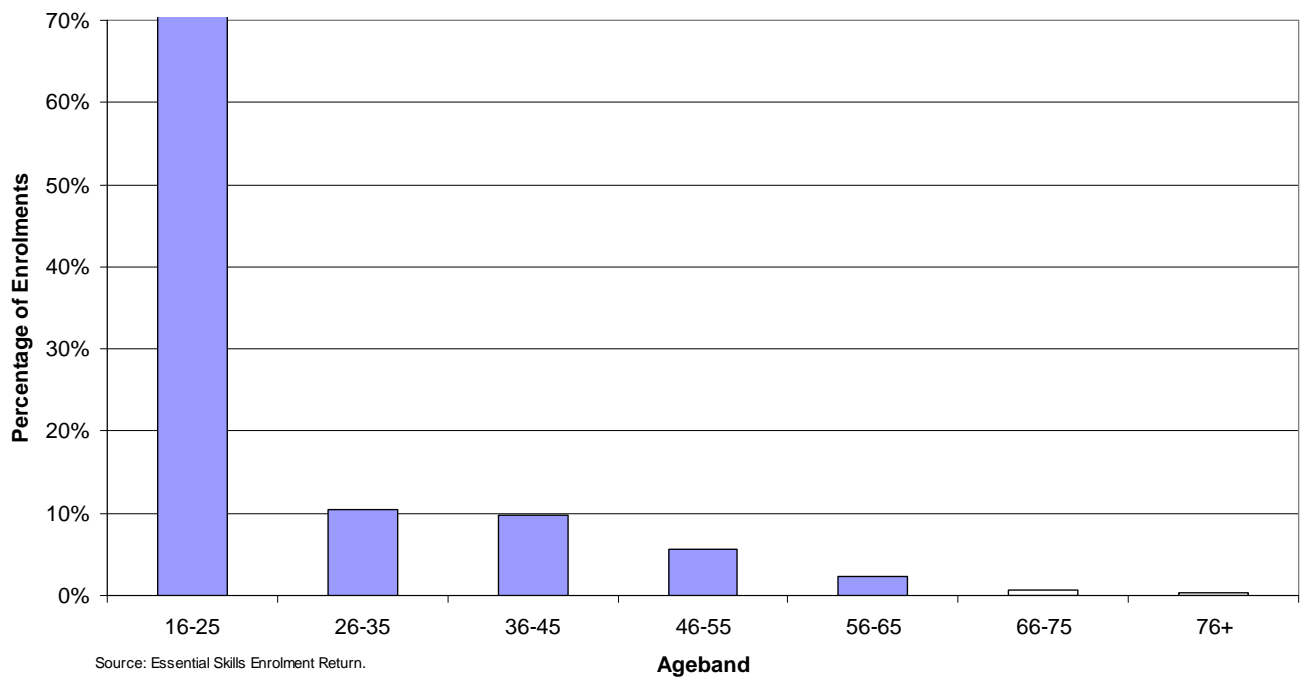

Employment Status

The bulk of participants are in part-time employment, with 49% of all enrolments in this category. This 'part-time employment' group includes most of the 16-19 cohort, with 71% of all those in part-time employment within this age band. There are also a high proportion of enrolments who have registered as being unemployed (22%) or economically inactive (17%). This is positive, in that the Strategy appears to be targeting those on the lowest rung of the skills ladder.

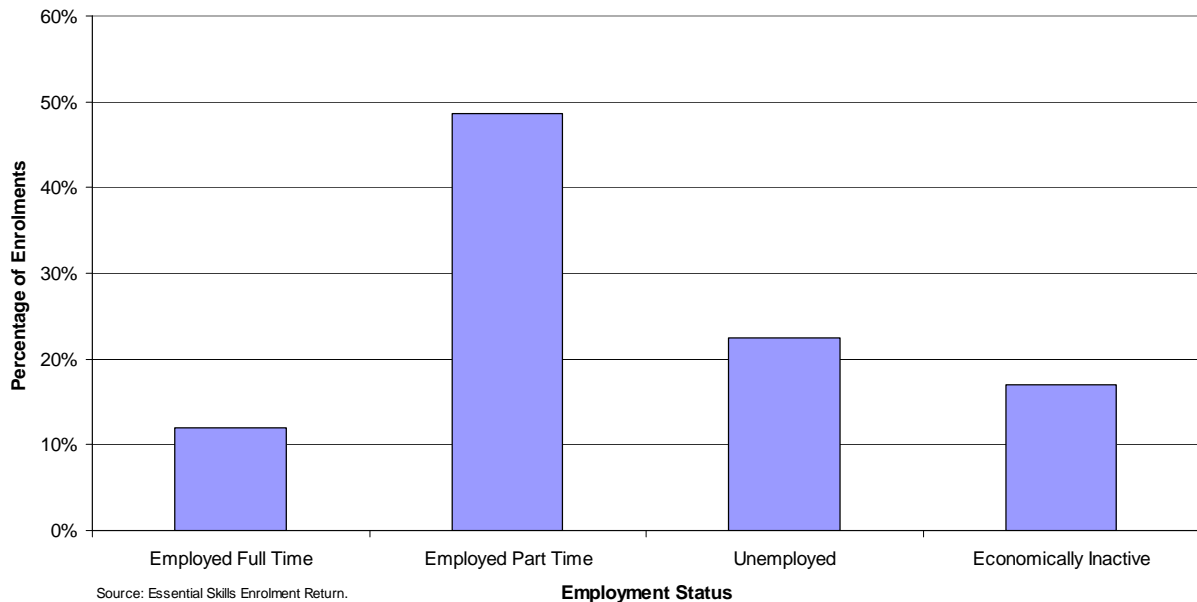

Community Background

There is an approximate even split across the two main religious denominations in NI, with a slight Catholic majority.

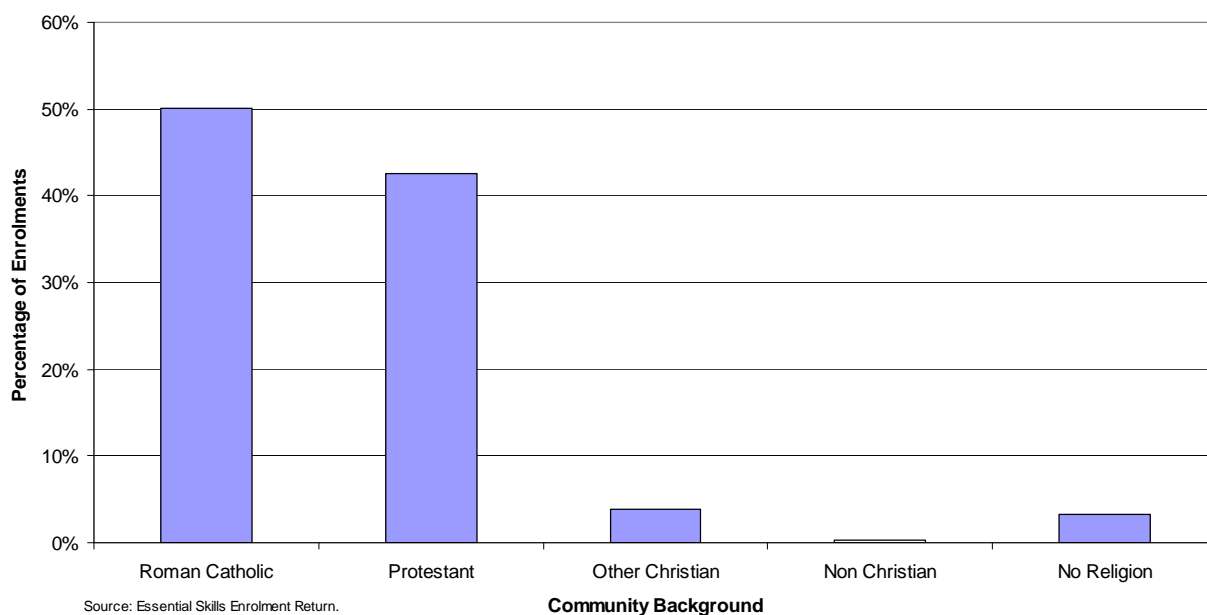

Gender

Gender breakdown remained evenly split over the first few years. Interestingly since 2006/07, male enrolments have been the majority. In the last academic year males accounted for 53% of enrolments. This is actually the inverse for those enrolled in Professional & Technical subjects within Further Education Colleges (51% female, FESR, 2008/09).

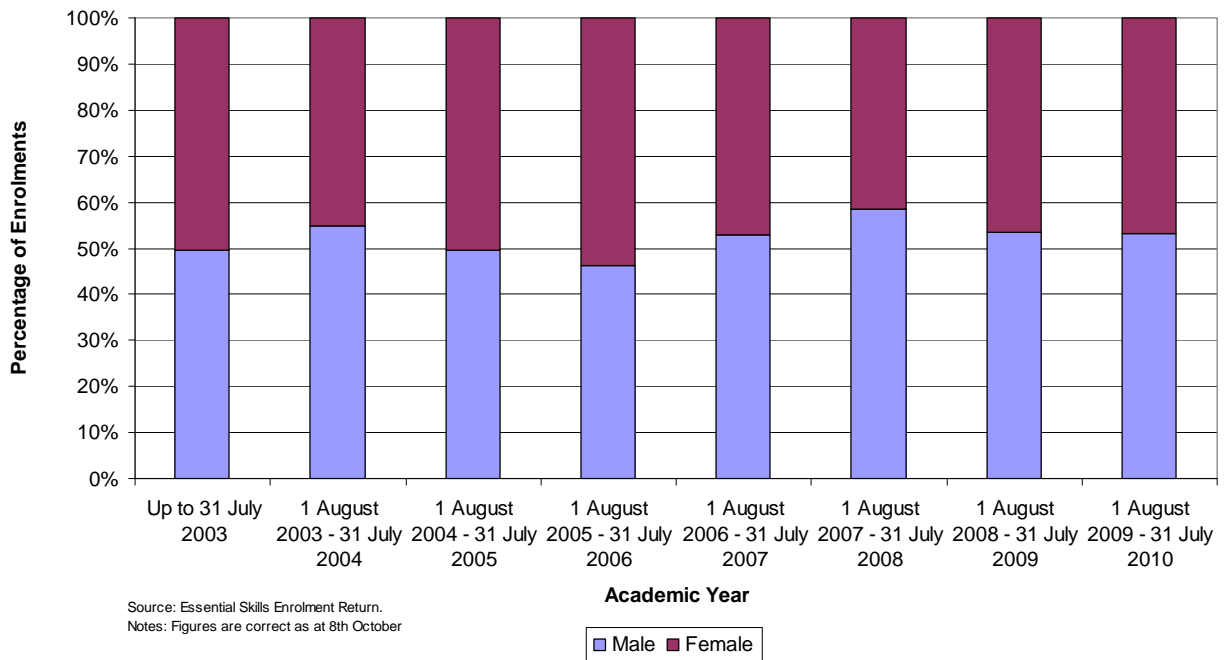

Deprivation Analysis

Table 6 and Figure 6 show the number and percentage of Essential Skill enrolments within each quintile of super output areas (SOA) respectively, in terms of deprivation levels. The analysis has correlated the NI Multiple Deprivation Measure¹ against the SOA the participant has indicated where they are from (based on their postcode) upon enrolment. It is encouraging that people from the most deprived SOAs are engaging and enrolling in Essential Skills courses. The graph illustrates that 31% of all ES enrolments are within the most deprived quintile of SOAs.

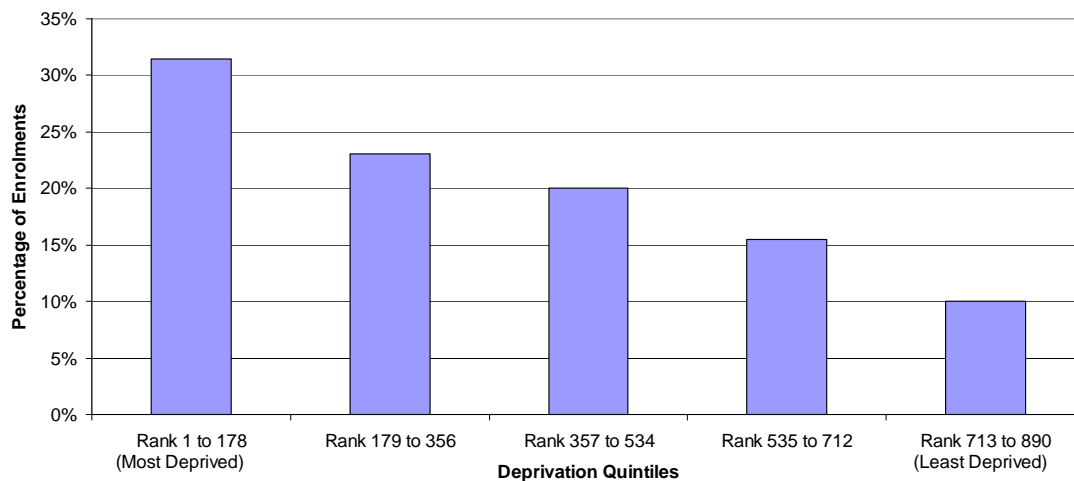

Figure 6: Essential Skills Enrolments by NI Multiple Deprivation Rank of Super Output Areas

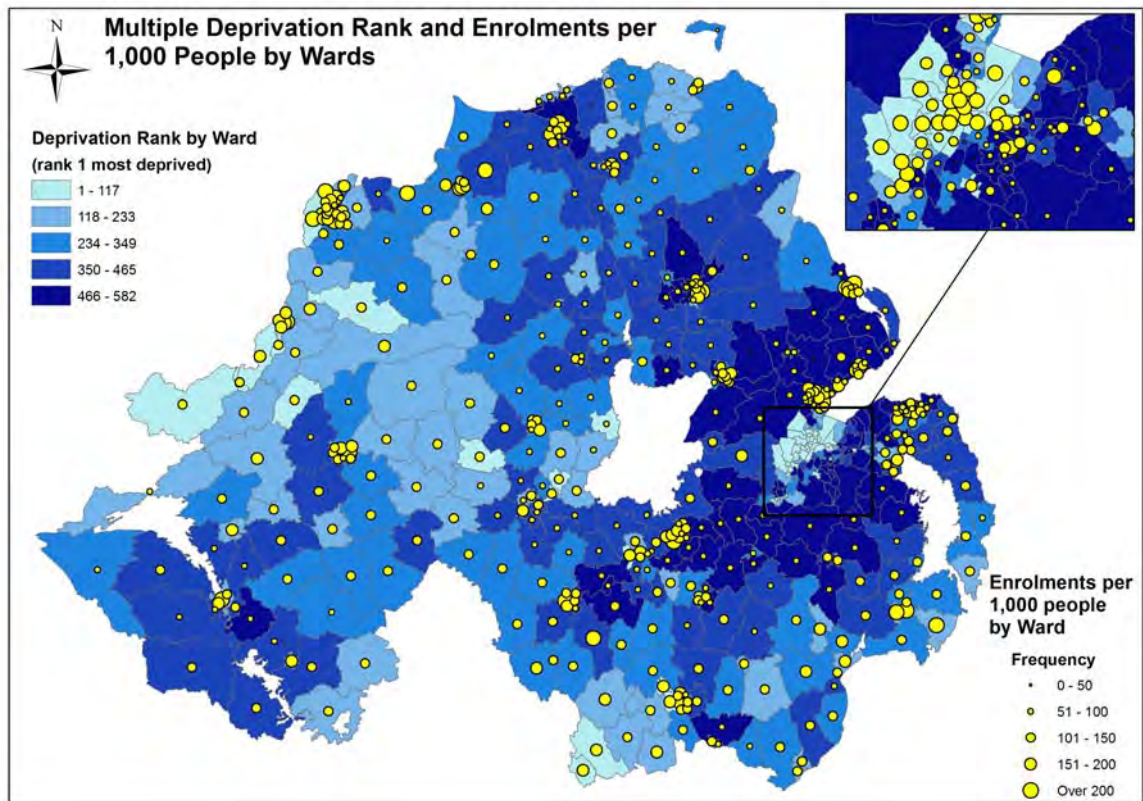

The map Figure 7, illustrates where the individuals are from, based on their postcode, and enrolling in Essential Skills courses in relation to the varying deprivation level of the wards within Northern Ireland. The number of enrolments per 1,000 of the population for each ward in Northern Ireland was mapped on top of the quintiles of wards in terms of their NI Multiple Deprivation Measure.

What courses are being studied?

There has been a shift in the most recent years from Literacy to Numeracy, resulting in an approximate balance in the courses that are being enrolled on. As can be seen in Figure 8, the most recent academic year indicates Literacy accounts for 39% and Numeracy 36% of Essential Skills enrolments. ICT enrolments are also accounted for as the full programme began rolling out in August 2009, accounting for 25% of enrolments in the last academic year.

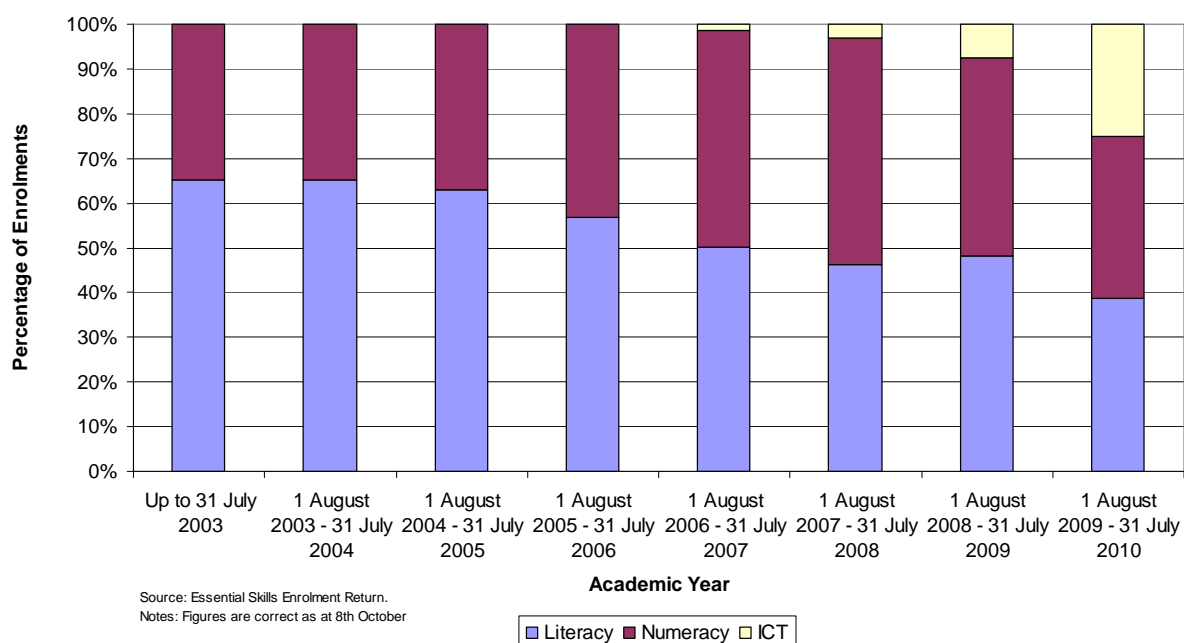

Where are the courses being studied?

The main delivery of Essential Skills course has occurred within FE Colleges, accounting for 69% of all registered enrolments since 2002.

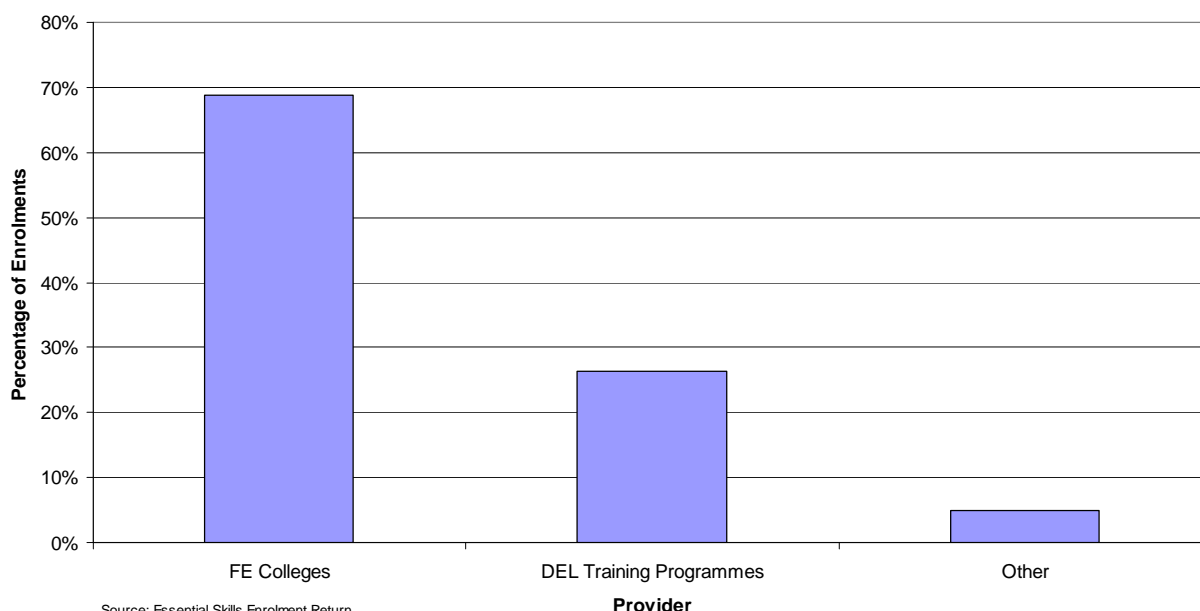

Number of Qualifications

Information from the Awarding Bodies indicates that there have been nearly 87,000 qualifications issued in Essential Skills since the Strategy began nearly eight years ago. As can be seen from Table 9 and Figure 10, the number of qualifications issued has increased progressively within each academic year.

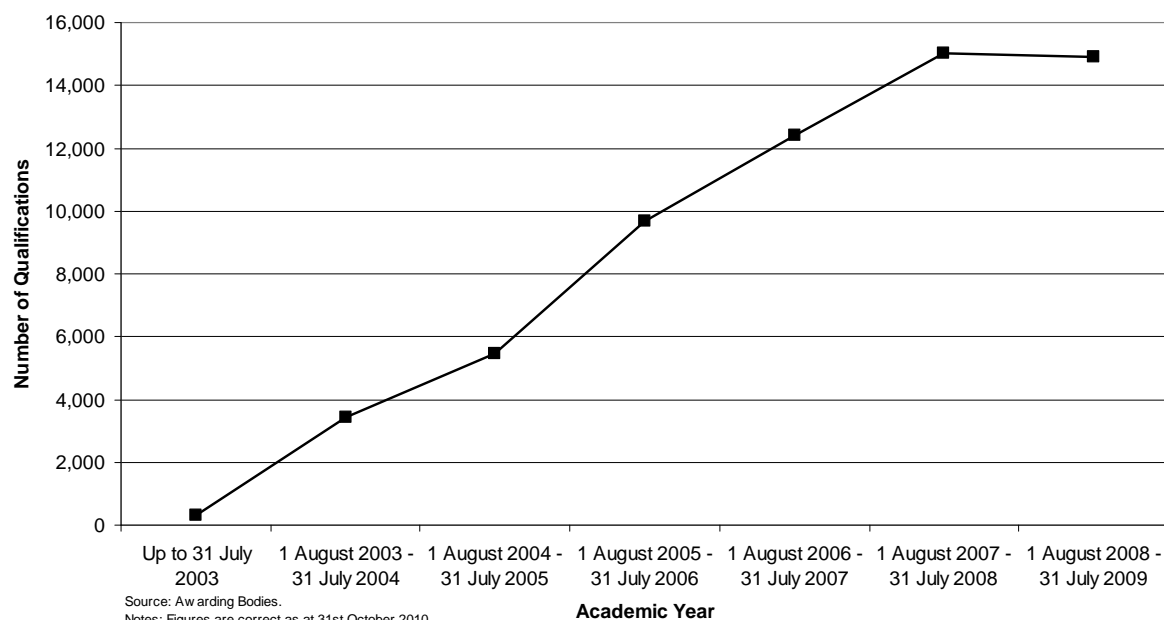

Achievements by subject

The trend of enrolments shifting in the most recent years from Literacy to Numeracy, is also reflected in the achievements within Essential Skills by subject. Figure 11 illustrates this trend. In the most recent academic year Literacy accounted for 45% and Numeracy 42% of Essential Skills qualifications issued. ICT qualifications accounted for 13% of qualifications issued in the last academic year.

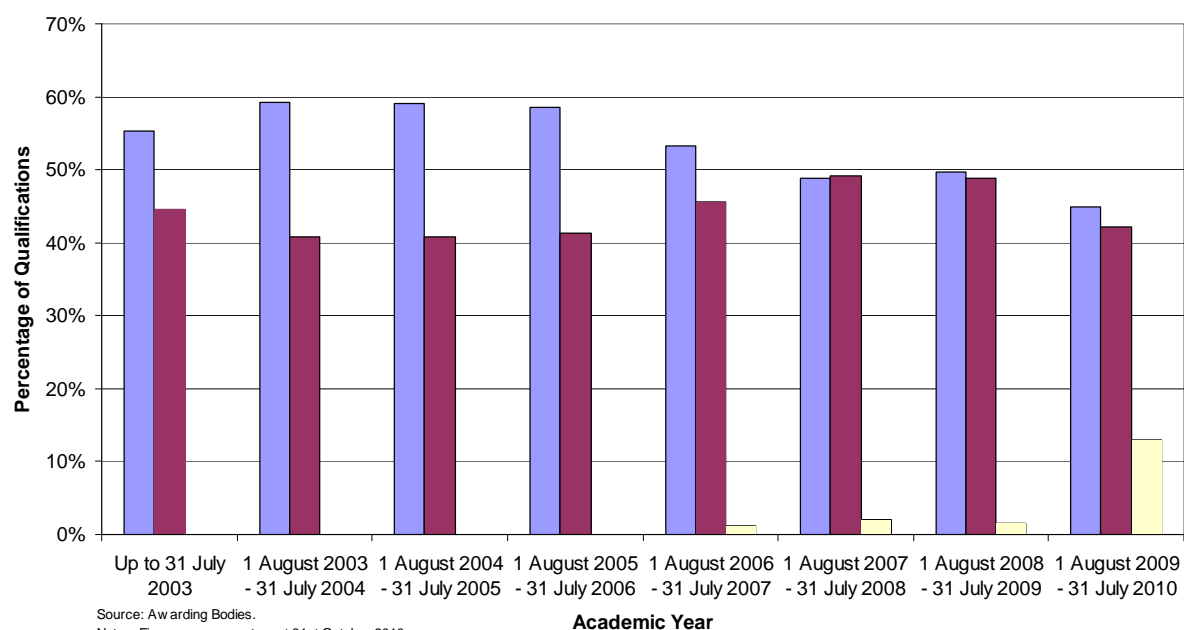

Achievements by level

Figure 12 illustrates the number qualifications within each level of Essential Skills which have been issued by awarding bodies. It shows that the majority of qualifications are at Level 1, accounting for 35% of all qualifications.

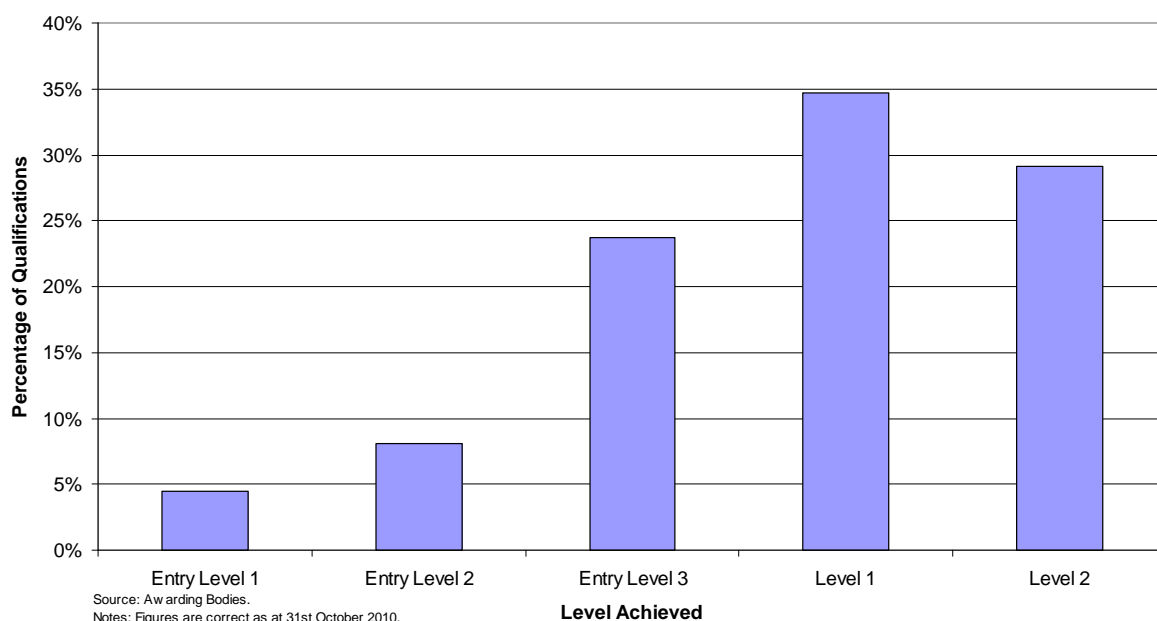

Performance

Over the course of the strategy the retention rate within Essential Skills courses is very high at 85%. The achievement rate within Essential Skills courses is 58% while the success rate is 49%. Over a tenth (14%) of those qualifying are 'progressing' within an Literacy or Numeracy Essential Skills programme. The progression rate is an indicator of those who qualify at least twice within a specific subject area and obtain a level higher than before.

Any qualifications within ICT (204) prior to 1st April 2008 are not included within the totals, as it was not part of the Department's Essential Skills Public Service Agreement target until 1st April 2008, which is based on the number of IOH1Hearners.

The current and third PSA Target, covering the next three years, has set a further 42,000 learners¹ to achieve an Essential Skills qualification (Literacy, Numeracy and ICT) by 31st March 2011. This current PSA target has been exceeded (as at 31st October 2010) 47,959 adult learners had achieved an Essential Skills qualification.

¹ ¹ In calculating the number of 'learners', the number of individuals within each subject area (Literacy, Numeracy or ICT) is determined. If someone has achieved multiple levels within a specific subject area (Literacy, Numeracy or ICT) then the earliest level achieved is kept for the analysis. Once the number of individuals within each subject area (Literacy, Numeracy or ICT) is obtained, then these figures are added to together to reach the total number of 'learners'.

Technical Notes

1. The source of the enrolment information is the Essential Skills enrolment return provided by all providers of the Essential Skills courses.
2. Essential Skills enrolment return lists the enrolment records which are assigned to a particular provider and returned to the Department. Through a process, detailed in the guidance 'Defining an Essential Skills enrolment', these records are analysed to determine the total number of Essential Skills enrolments.
3. Further Education colleges have indicated that there a number of Essential Skills enrolments which were collated on a paper basis and registered with awarding bodies but would never have been recorded on a computerised enrolment management system during the academic year 2002/03. Consequently these enrolments are not available and not included in this analysis.
4. The enrolment information is correct as at 8th October 2010. A small number of erroneous records are excluded from the Essential Skills enrolment database. Therefore figures are provisional are therefore subject to change.
5. The source of the qualification information is the monthly data provided by the awarding bodies.
6. The qualification information is correct as at 31st October 2010.
7. Due to ongoing technical issues with the reporting of qualifications by the awarding body CCEA, therefore figures can only be regarded as provisional and are subject to change.
8. Any qualifications within ICT (204) prior to 1st April 2008 are not included within the totals, as it was not part of the Department's Essential Skills Public Service Agreement target until 1st April 2008, which is based on the number of learners.
9. An academic year for this analysis has been defined as the 1st August 20XX to the 31st July 20XX+1.
10. Age is based on the date of birth provided, if known, and the start date of the course.
11. Please refer to Annex 1 for calculations on performance statistics.
12. In order to protect identification of individuals within this analysis disclosure policy has been applied where appropriate. This can either be cell sizes less than five being masked or certain categories being excluded from the full breakdown and only a total being presented within a note accompanying the table.

Essential Skills Performance Statistics – Calculations:

$$\text{Retention rate} = \frac{\text{Number of non-withdrawals}}{\text{Number of Enrolments}}$$

$$\text{Achievement rate} = \frac{\text{Number of achievements}}{\text{Number of non-withdrawals}}$$

$$\text{Success rate} = \frac{\text{Number of achievements}}{\text{Number of Enrolments}} \quad \text{OR} \quad \text{Retention rate} \times \text{Achievement rate}$$

Any enrolment records that have been recorded as transfers will have an accompanying second enrolment record (the one they have transferred onto). Through the guidance of the 'Defining an Essential Skills enrolment', these will be accounted for and only one record will remain for analysis, so no records recorded as transfers are included in any of the analysis.

Number of non-withdrawals – These include any enrolments which have not been classified as a withdrawal, namely those options within Course Status - 'Continuing', 'Completed' or the status is unknown.

Number of achievements – For Essential Skills, if an enrolment has an achieved level recorded against it, relevant to whether it matches the target level set initially, it will be counted in the total number of achievements.
