Some 214,000 individuals have participated in Essential Skills to date, accounting for over 530,000 enrolments and almost 345,000 qualifications.

...there has been a decrease in the annual number of enrolments in each of the past 7 years.

Due to a combination of factors, including a dip in the 16-19 year old population (the main age group taking Essential Skills) and improvements in GCSE grades, annual enrolments have decreased for seven consecutive years, from a peak of 59,944 in 2010/11 to 31,388 in 2017/18.

The annual number of qualifications issued has decreased for the fourth consecutive year.

The annual number of qualifications issued reached a peak of 40,851 in 2013/14, before decreasing, at a faster rate than enrolments, to 18,395 in 2017/18. A refresh of Essential Skills curriculum standards is likely to have been an important factor in the two most recent academic years.

The proportion of enrolments of males has increased for a third year in succession...

Over the 16-year history of the Strategy, 53.4% of enrolments have been from male students. Since 2014/15, the proportion of male enrolments has been increasing slowly each year, reaching 55.2% in 2017/18.

...while three in every five enrolments have been from those aged 16-19.

Since the start of the Essential Skills Strategy, almost three-fifths (59.4%) of enrolments have been from those aged 16-19. Sixteen-year-olds alone have accounted for over a quarter (25.8%) of all enrolments.

A majority of enrolments have been from the unemployed or economically inactive...

In 2017/18, over three-fifths (62.3%) of enrolments were from those who were unemployed or economically inactive, compared with an average of 55.8% over the history of the Strategy.

...and a higher proportion of enrolments are from the most deprived areas.

Generally, the more deprived an area is, the higher the number of enrolments from those living in that area. Over the 16 years of the Strategy, over half of enrolments (51.6%) have been from the two most deprived quintiles. In 2017/18, the most deprived of the five quintiles accounted for 26.3% of enrolments, with the least deprived quintile accounting for 10.8%.

The most popular subject choice has varied across age groups.

From 2002/03 to 2017/18, Numeracy has been the most popular subject choice among those aged 16-19 (39.8%), while Literacy has been most popular among 20-44 year olds (44.1%). For those aged 45+, the most common subject studied has been ICT (38.6%).

The majority of enrolments result in a qualification being issued...

Almost two-thirds (65.6%) of Essential Skills enrolments result in a qualification being issued. For Numeracy enrolments, the equivalent success rate is 68.0%, while it is 67.6% for Literacy and 57.3% for ICT.

...although fewer have been issued at Level 2 in recent years. The Essential Skills refresh is likely to have been an important factor in a recent decrease in the proportion of Level 2 qualifications issued, from 60.4% in 2015/16 to 47.6% in 2017/18, and a corresponding increase in the Entry Level share, from 11.8% to 20.5%.
